It's no secret, minimizing falls helps your residents and facility

Falls are one of the most significant challenges in long-term care. **They're the leading cause of injury among adults ages 65 and over¹**, and every year they impact thousands of residents and leave long-term care facilities like yours facing increased costs, limited resources, strained staff, and disrupted operations.

Why falls are so common— and costly

Every fall that occurs affects more than just a resident—it impacts their family, your staff, and even your facility’s reputation. When the stakes are this high, understanding the full picture of falls becomes crucial.

For residents in long-term care, falls are the leading cause of injury. Each year, 1 in 4 adults aged 65 and older experiences a fall.² This translates to millions of older adults suffering falls annually and makes this age group more vulnerable to injury.

More than that, falls can reduce residents’ confidence and mobility, which can increase their reliance on staff and lead to more intensive care needs. These additional demands not only impact residents and staffing, but also facility’s resources and occupancy levels.

The impact of falls on your bottom line

The average direct annual cost of falls per location is up to

\$380,000

meaning for operators with 20 or more locations,

that number can reach up to **\$7.6 million** each year.³

The costs associated with falls are often greater than they initially appear to be. Each incident goes beyond immediate care and has ripple effects on revenue, staff workload, and operational flow.

Falls can result in hospitalizations or extended medical care, which can lead to temporary or even permanent resident move-outs. Each unoccupied bed represents lost revenue, as the facility incurs fixed costs without receiving resident fees. For some facilities, even brief resident absences can be financially challenging.

Administrative tasks related to resident discharges and readmissions also add to the burden. Coordinating these transitions requires extra staff time and resources that might otherwise be directed toward resident care.

The impact of falls on your daily operations

When a fall occurs, the consequences go beyond finances. Staff are immediately affected as well, from additional care duties to handling administrative work, all of which can increase workload and strain.

Increased workload on staff

Every fall means additional duties for caregivers and administrators alike. Staff must respond quickly, provide follow-up care, monitor residents more frequently, and manage documentation and care planning. These added responsibilities reduce the time available for other essential tasks and can contribute to burnout, impacting both morale and retention.

Quality metrics and financial repercussions

Increased fall rates can affect facility quality ratings, which play a crucial role in public perception and reimbursement rates. Frequent falls can lead to reduced reimbursements, putting further financial strain on facilities. **Falls among older adults result in about \$80 billion in annual medical costs, with Medicare covering two-thirds of these expenses⁴** — highlighting the impact falls can have on healthcare systems and underscores the need for proactive prevention strategies.

Alerts staff to changes in a resident's condition, allowing them to make informed decisions to help reduce the occurrence of an incident.



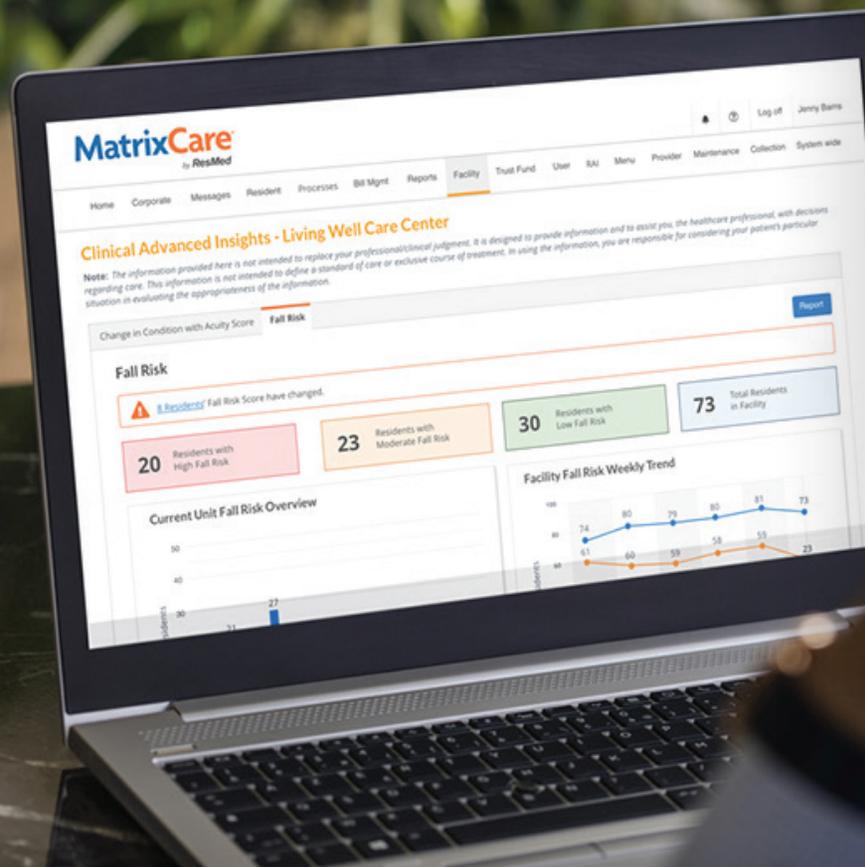
Streamlined monitoring
